4. Informational Presentations

a. Implementation of the Clean Power Alliance: Bringing clean energy choices to Simi Valley

Karen Schmidt, Regional Affairs Manager, made the presentation. The Clean Power Alliance (CPA) was established in 2017 to provide cost competitive electric services, reduce greenhouse gas emissions, stimulate renewable energy development, promote energy efficiency and demand reduction programs, and sustain long-term rate stability for residents and businesses through local control. Consumers can choose one of three energy procurement options from the CPA: Lean Power, Clean Power or 100% Green Power. They can also opt out completely and continue to have Southern California Edison as their sole energy provider.

b. Little Free Libraries: Neighborhood book exchanges around the world

Julia Hammon made the presentation. Little Free Library is a registered nonprofit organization that inspires a love of reading, builds community, and sparks creativity by fostering neighborhood book exchanges. An individual Little Free Library is a “take a book, return a book” free book exchange. They come in many shapes and sizes, but the most common version is a small wooden box of books. Anyone may take a book or bring a book to share. They also maintain a world map of registered Little Free Libraries to help people find and share books wherever they are, and they donate Little Free Libraries to communities where books are scarce. This is very important for children living in these communities because one of the most successful ways to improve the reading achievement of children is to increase their access to books, especially at home.

5. Public Statements/Comments

Robbie Hidalgo, Vice President of Simi at the Garden, discussed the Garden of Dreams Community Service Initiative. By researching and integrating the best-practices of leading community gardens throughout the U.S., the Garden of Dreams project expands the breadth of benefits and services the garden delivers to the entire community by providing educational, therapeutic, work, job training, transitional employment and support services to youths, seniors, recovery, trauma and mental health populations, veterans, the disabled and other disadvantaged community members. On November 27, the County Behavioral Health will begin a series of community focus groups to determine the specific needs for the mental health services in Simi Valley that they have begun to provide.

6. Informational Presentation

a. The City's National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) plan for public outreach & education

Brent Siemer, Deputy Public Works Director (Development Services)/Floodplain Manager & NFIP (National Flood Insurance Program) CRS Coordinator, made the presentation. He explained that in 1991, the City joined the National Flood Insurance Program so that it could receive

Federal funds to implement flood control programs. Part of this program are the Flood Insurance Rate Maps, which show the predicted areas that would flood in a "100 year storm". Anyone who lives in these areas is required to buy flood insurance.

In 1999, the City joined the Community Rating System. The ratings run from 9 (the worst) to 1. Through this system, by implementing specific improvements in many areas, an entity can raise its community rating. Each step up decreases the amount affected residents have to pay the Federal government for flood insurance. Simi Valley is currently near the top of level 6. One way the City can move up to level 5 is to create a an NFIP Public Information Committee. This committee would have eight Executive Board members, two from each Neighborhood Council, among its number and would meet once a year to review and comment on City flood control efforts.

7. New Business

- a. Appointment of two Neighborhood Council representatives to an NFIP Public Information Committee

Due to lack of a quorum, the Executive Board was not able to make the following formal recommendation:

Neighborhood Council #2 supports providing two volunteers on an annual basis to serve in the Community Rating System Program for Public Information Committee.

However, all six members present were in favor of the recommendation.

8. Community Services Coordinator's Report

Emily Habib discussed the current upcoming recruitment for the March 2019 term, which closes on December 7. She also discussed the very successful November 3 grand opening of the Discovery Garden, the new native plant teaching garden in the children's patio at the Simi Valley Library. It was attended by approximately 70 people, both adults and children.
